From the Interim Pastor

What's your Spiritual Type?

Over the past six months, I have invited various individuals within the congregation to take a *Spiritual Type* inventory (a brief and confidential questionnaire). I began with groups of individuals, including the Gleaners, the Choir, the Call Committee and the



Church Council. More recently I have approached individuals who have not already participated. If I've not approached you, please approach me! I would love to include you in this. No one will see your results other than you and me.

The *Spiritual Type* inventory was created based on the work of a former dean of the School of Theology at the University of the South in Sewanee, Tennessee (an Episcopal Seminary). His work laid the foundation for the book *Discover Your Spiritual Type, A Guide to Individual and Congregational Growth*, by Corinne Ware.

The *Spiritual Type* inventory identifies an individual's primary spiritual type. There are four spiritual types and we all "visit" all four types, but predominantly "land" in one of the four types. All four are Biblical and can be found in the history of the Church. They complement one another. No one type is better than the other –they are just different! Research shows that, over time, congregations may gradually mold into the spiritual type

of the pastor, with neither the pastor, nor congregation, being aware of it happening. This tends to happen in longer term pastorates.

Sometimes individuals visit a congregation briefly but do not return, and sometimes people leave a congregation after having been there for years. Often, in both situations, it is because they are not being fed spiritually. This may have nothing to do with the quality of sermons, music, or the existing groups and programs offered at the church. They may simply be a spiritual type trying to "eat off the menu" of an overwhelmingly different spiritual type congregation. For these individuals, it is not about "more food." It is about "different food," or at least differently flavored food. Perhaps you've visited a congregation while on vacation or such and left feeling it was a mismatch for you personally. It likely has to do with your spiritual type not being aligned with what you just experienced at the church you visited.

What is your predominant spiritual type? Take the inventory and find out! It is a painless process and will provide you with some insight into your spirituality. In addition, it will help in the Call Process as we will discover what the predominant *Spiritual Type* of Zion Lutheran is. This information will assist the Call Committee and the Church Council when interviewing candidates to be Zion's next Pastor.
