Reflections

Here is a parable for us to ponder as we reflect on what it means for us to live and work together as the Church:



The church is like the man who pulled into a gas station on the outskirts of town. As he filled his tank, he remarked to the attendant (this is obviously an old story), "I've just accepted a job in town. I've never been to this part of the country. What are people like around here?"

"What are people like where you came from?" the attendant asked.

"Well, not so nice," the man replied. "In fact, they can be quite rude."

The attendant shook his head. "Well, I'm afraid you'll find the people in this town to be the same way."

Just then another car pulled into the station. "Excuse me," the driver called out. "I'm just moving into the area. It is nice here?"

"Was it nice where you came from?" the attendant inquired.

"Oh, yes! I came from a great place. The people were friendly, and I hated to leave."

"Well, you'll find the same to be true in this town," informed the attendant.

"Thanks!" yelled the driver as he pulled away.

The first man, now irritated with the attendant's conflicting reports, asked the man to explain, "Well, which is it? What is this town really like?"

What do you think the answer was/is? Remember, this is a parable about the church.

There are two answers really: 1) You often get what you expect, and 2) We often get what we create.

Let me reflect on those answers for a moment. "You often get what you expect." If that's true, then when I encounter a new place, new people, a new church, what I bring with me colors what I will get. If I come with the expectation that more people are unfriendly or aloof, that is what I will experience, because (listen up here) I'm sure to find that here (or anywhere). But how about if what I expect is that the church will be friendly, open, courteous, and welcoming, then the first person who greets me warmly will reinforce that expectation.

Now, all of this doesn't relieve any of us from the responsibility of representing the Body of Christ in this place as the kind of place Jesus intends for us to be. Just because a person's expectations may be slightly less than positive, doesn't mean that they can't be altered or changed by the reality of what they face. But it can, and does, go both ways.

Now, for the second of the answers, which is more complicated: "We often get what we create." I believe any group has the power within itself to create their culture, climate, and conditions. We are not bound to the past. We don't have to repeat what has happened before. Today, this day and this time, is a new day to be the church of Christ.

So, what climate are we creating? What culture would we like to pass down to future generations of God's people? If it isn't what we want it to be (and this calls for brutal honesty), then how can we change it.

I'm not making any inferences or judgments here at all. But please realize, all of us have a stake in Zion's ministry and the kind of church we can become.

So, what kind of town (read "church") is this? It depends, does it not, on what we expect to find and what we are willing to help create?

Yep, it all depends. It's that old "U R" thing in the spelling of chURch.

Update from Church Council



This monthly update from Council shares highlights of the most recent Council meeting to keep the congregation informed of things happening around Zion Church.

The May meeting of Church Council was held May 14.

In the pulpit: With a sense of sadness we say "So long" (not good-bye or even farewell) to Pastor Glenn Ludwig, who has served so magnificently as our Interim Pastor since February. President McCommons is in regular contact with the Synod office in the hope of securing another interim pastor while the call process works itself out. In the meantime, our pastoral needs will be covered by weekly supply pastors. Pastor Ludwig left us with his observations of the ministry needs of the Dauphin/Middle Paxton community, and Zion's potential role in meeting those needs.

In the future: In the coming months, based in part on Pastor Ludwig's observations, Council will be reviewing and evaluating the best way for our congregation to fulfill God's mission in our community. This will be a churchwide effort, and input will be welcome and solicited from everyone.

On Council's "want list": Although church committee work appears to be on the back burner during the summer, now is when we need to focus on renewed leadership and commitment to this important aspect of our congregational life. We are blessed that, somehow, everything always seems to get done. However, as evidenced by the success of our Outreach Committee and Hospitality Committee, more can be done better and easier when there is leadership and structure in place to get the job done.

The rains have come; the grass is growing; find a week when no one has volunteered, sign up and cut the grass! The church has a lawnmower.

Every week we collect an offering. Immediately after church, it is counted and accounted for. Although it may sound daunting if you have never tried it, it is a quick and easy job and training is provided. Counting is done immediately after worship and generally takes less than 15 minutes.

Our Property: Thanks to Floyd Bechtel our beautiful shrubbery is maintained, manicured, and thriving. Sam Wesner took responsibility for fixing the sinkhole in the rear corner of the parking lot. The hole has been filled and the area repaved. And, we have a new copier in the

Parish House. Those bulletins that magically appear every Sunday don't reproduce themselves!
